The arrow through your head is a spin off of true Steve Martin comedy style. Whether you are studying Dalí and his interest in St. Sebastian's persecution, the myth of William Tell, indigenous hunter-gatherers, or Shakespeare's Hamlet, Act III...this simple craft will hit the mark with adults and children alike.

Materials Required:

8.5 x 11", B/W copies of arrow tip and feathers, 2 of each per project (colored paper optional) . Scissors, Tacky or Elmer's Glue, 2 matched-color chenille stems.

How To Do It:

1. **Connect 2 Chenille stems at the center by twisting the last 2" of the stem around each other.**
2. **Bend the stem into a horseshoe shape with 4" extensions on either side.**
3. **Cut out 2 arrow points and 2 arrow feathers.**
4. **Place glue on the inside of one piece and match with the other, sandwiching the 4" stem extension in between, close to the bend**
5. **Place on head and secure using bobby pins, if needed.**



The craft related to Salvador Dalí

Salvador Dalí was very interested in the myths of Oedipus and William Tell and how each father was willing to risk his son's life for his own personal gain. Dalí was also interested in the story of St. Sebastian and how he was shot with arrows, strapped to a tree and left to die ...only he didn't die. Dalí related these stories and others to his own personal estrangement from his father and family - an issue he dealt with all of his life.
